Suboxone

What is it?

- A combination of Buprenorphine and Naloxone
- Available as a tablet or sublingual film

How does it work?

- Binds to the same brain receptors as heroin, morphine, and fentanyl - blocking the “high”
- Reduces the risk of fatal overdose by 50%
- Significantly decreases opioid cravings

How is it used?

- Helps stabilize individuals experiencing opioid withdrawal
- Can be used for long-term maintenance to support recovery.

Buprenorphine

What is it?

- A prescription medication used to treat opioid use disorder
- Helps reduce cravings and ease withdrawal Symptoms
- Available as a sublingual tablet, patch, or injection

How does it work?

- Diminishes withdrawal symptoms and physical dependency
- Binds to opioid receptors in the brain
- Shown to reduce the risk of the fatal overdoses by 50%

How is it used?

- Stabilized individuals in opioid withdrawal
- Can be used as a long-term maintenance program to support recovery

Naltrexone

What is it?

- A medication available as a monthly injection (Vivitrol) or daily pill
- Non-addictive and not an opioid

How does it work?

- Blocks the “reward” effect of alcohol and opioids in the brain
- Helps reduce cravings and the urge to use

How is it used?

- Supports individuals in early recovery by lowering relapse risk
- Used as part of a long-term maintenance plan for sobriety

Vivitrol

What is it?

- A monthly injectable form of Naltrexone
- Non-narcotic and non-addictive
- Provides a steady release of medication throughout the month
- Treats Alcohol and Opioid Use Disorders

How does it work?

- Blocks the effects of alcohol and opioids in the brains
- Does not cause a “high” or sedation
- Reduces cravings and lowers the desire to drink or use opioids

How is it used?

- Given once a month by a healthcare provider
- Helps stabilize individuals in early recovery
- Can be used as a long-term maintenance options to support lasting sobriety

Sublocade

What is it?

- A monthly injectable form of Buprenorphine
- Provides a steady release of medication throughout the month

How does it work?

- Blocks the “high” from opioids by attaching to brain receptors
- Reduces cravings and helps prevent relapse

How is it used?

- Given once a month by a healthcare provider
- Helps stabilize people in early recovery
- Can also be used as a long-term maintenance treatment to support lasting sobriety

Naloxone

What is it?

- Given through a nasal spray or intramuscularly, similar to an EPI-PEN

How does it work?

- Naloxone can quickly restore breathing to a person if their breath has stopped or slowed to to an overdoses.
- Multiple doses can be administered without harming the individual

How is it used?

If the individual is showing the following signs:

- Unconscious or unresponsive
- Shallow breathing
- Limpness
- Blue gums, blue lips, blue fingertips
- Slow or irregular heartbeat or pulse
